<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A one-time state sales tax refund of up to \$5,000 of taxes paid for machinery and equipment to be used in the enterprise zone may be available to a qualified business that has operated in a state designated enterprise zone for at least three years and retains at least 10 jobs</li> <li>• A one-time franchise tax refund of up to \$5,000 based upon \$500 for each new job created may be available to a qualified business in a state designated enterprise zone when at least 10 new jobs have been created</li> </ul> Both of these effect tax payers		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Tax Increment Financing, one-stop permits and tax abatements all help growing businesses</li> <li>• Job creation and retention, this benefits the 20% of citizens in the area that are below the poverty line, according to Census.</li> </ul>

<b>Secondary responsibility</b>		It can also be funded by transferring of public building at below market cost to companies, low interest loans, waving certain fees for qualifying enterprise zones
